Dear Parents/Carers

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your support during this term. We had a wonderful start in September welcoming staff and pupils back to school despite the challenging situation we all found ourselves in. I'm sure you will all agree that despite the pandemic everyone has tried their best to settle back into school life and find a new normal.

I'm sure you're aware the school is currently organised in PODS at the moment however I can assure you each pod has been extremely busy this half term covering their specific class topic under the school theme of "A Long Time Ago". Since my update at half term we have a lot more to tell you about;

Pod 1: Class JB have been reading "The Enormous Turnip" as their sensory story which is great fun. They have been to the forest school to observe changes in our plants and trees, planted turnip and cress seeds, which they are recording the growth of through photographs. They have also had a vegetable sensory table which is very popular and are using radish and sprouts to count with in the maths area as well as comparing lengths of beans! They have rolled out vegetables in paint and printed with them, used peas to make musical instruments and cooked delicious vegetable soup, cauliflower cheese and vegetable pizzas.

In class HJ they have been busy making star Christmas decorations, decorating the class Christmas tree and preparing some wonderful hats for the school virtual advent calendar. They have also been very busy with various free choice creative activities, immersing themselves in lots of multi-sensory learning.

Pod 1a: Since returning to School after the extended half-term break, the Primary Sensory Class have continued working on their topic of Marvellous Machines. The pupils came back to school in such a positive and settled manner, that it was easy to 'pick-up' the work where they 'left-off' before the break. So we have been digging like tractors in sand in Sensory Story and honking horns like buses in 4D. In Jigsaw and RE our focus has developed slightly, so we are considering 'choices that we make' and 'what makes us unique?' this half-term. In Let's Play we continue to develop our object recognition and choice making skills.

We have continued to use a range of Marvellous Machines in our ECT and Food Technology lessons. We especially enjoyed using the food mixer with a switch to make different recipes. The foot spa has also been very popular this half term.

We are looking forward to the end of term when we can get into the festive spirit with the creative work that we will move onto.

Pod 2: Class KHa have been learning about the ancient Egyptian pyramids, tombs and the journey to the afterlife. They have also made puppets for exploring shadows in science.

Class BL have been reading The Story of Robin Hood and followed Jack on his journey as he tries to rescue his Dad from the Sheriff of Nottingham. We have made our own swords and bows and arrows to help Jack fight the soldiers, and even made some dung to throw at the evil Sheriff! We have spent lots of time in Forest School, exploring and learning about the habitat and which animals may live there, making our own bug hotels to encourage insects to move in.

One of their favourite activities has been making a castle - this was a lot of fun and gave the class a lot of opportunities to explore shapes, colours and learn the parts of the castle, and eventually use it as a role play area to act out parts of our story. The communication group have continued to visit forest school where they have been learning about animal habitats. The pupils also enjoyed learning about the Jewish festival of Hanukah and learned how to play dreidel, a game played by Jewish children.

Pod 3: Class HHa have continued their theme of Marvellous Machines and have had lots of fun participating in their "Marvellous Me and "Walk of Wonder" sensory stories as well as their sensory drama session "The Journey". They have been using switch activated equipment to generate song sequences and to create delicious delights in the food tech room. They are now fully immersed in Christmas activities and are exploring lots of festive delights in their sensory story "Christmas Cracker".

Pod 3a: SCERTS have been working on the Marvellous Machines theme. We have read stories including The Journey Home from Grandpa's, Blast off and The Fire Engine is Flashing. We have looked at machines such as robots, cars, fire engines and the parts that they are made of including nuts, bolts and gears. We have completed printing, paint rolling and gluing and sticking to create items related to this theme. Class FH have continued with their Time Travellers sensory story and got better at anticipating cues and using props. They are now looking forward to getting ready for Christmas, taking part in our 'T'was the Night Before Christmas' story and doing lots of delicious baking in the Food Tech room.

Pod 4: This term class LM have been working through our topic Britain at War! Learning about life in WW1 and WW2. We have looked at the life of soldiers in the trenches in WW1 and how important the Christmas Truce was. We have looked at the life of evacuees and people at home in WW2 and how the role of women changed. We had a WW2 day and have tried some recipes from WW2. In English we have created poetry, newspaper articles and reports on part of the world wars and created some beautiful paintings in art.



Class SL have been continuing to learn about World War Two, exploring recipes that could be made during rationing and have had a go at making some of these- they thought the pancakes were really tasty! They have also been learning about codes and cracking codes after learning about Alan Turing, the WW2 codebreaker. In PSHE, they have been focusing on 'Celebrating Differences' and knowing that everyone is unique and special. The class have also been working with Angie to create a range of Christmas themed arts and crafts.

Finally, in College, pupils have continued to participate in their personalised routes of study. The horticulture group have been practising the art of pressing flowers and have used these to create handmade Christmas cards that will be for sale alongside their unique Christmas wreathes. In cookery, pupils have researched recipes to make Christmas sweets and treats and they have created a timetable of Christmas events they would like to participate in including scavenger hunts and quizzes.

Please note that we close for the Christmas break at the end of school on Friday 18th December and pupils will return on Tuesday 5th January.

We would like to wish all our pupils, their families and carers and all of our staff a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year. Please stay safe and look after yourselves and your families over the festive period.

Hello to our new starters this term, Primrose and Willow Two very happy, energetic little girls who are eager to learn and have fun in the process. Welcome to class FJB!





Autumn term 2020 in FJB began with much excitement when our eggs arrived in class. We set up the incubator and watched and waited. It wasn't long before our eggs began to hatch and within the week we had nine healthy chicks, five cockerels and four hens. The children had the opportunity to watch as some of our chicks hatched and we videoed one hatching which we shared with the rest of the school. We have learned about the parts of the castle and had lots of fun shooting arrows from the battlements! We all hated the Sheriff of Nottingham just as much as Robin Hood and Jack, so we made our own dung and threw it at him just like Jack does in the story — luckily no one came to arrest us though!

We have been very lucky with the weather this term and have been to the Forest School every week. The best week was our Halloween celebration — we took it in turns to go on a spooky trail and listen to ghost stories! We even cooked our own jacket potatoes and hot dogs to try.

We have lots of exciting things planned for the Spring term, so I hope you all have a wonderful Christmas and come back refreshed for lots of new and exciting activities!







KHa

This term, class Kha have studied the life of Ancient Egyptians. We have explored the different types of food the ancient Egyptians used to eat. We have looked at the River Nile and how the ancient Egyptians used it to grow their food and trade between communities, we even constructed our own river Nile! Mummies are also a focus point in our topic and we have had a look at how they are made and why they are made the way they are.

As part of our display we designed our very own Ancient Egyptian self-portraits they mixed their own skin colour and used a range of media to create their Egyptian head-dress and collar.



















AH

Our Class have really enjoyed this term's book, 'The Story of Robin Hood' and have linked a lot of work to the story. We re-created the dung throwing scene and all enjoyed flinging dung at the wicked Sheriff of Nottingham, we designed and made our own swords and we all helped to make a large model of a castle. We visit forest school every Tuesday which ties in nicely with Robin Hood's antics and we have enjoyed making bug hotels and going on listening walks.









CR/SD

The Primary Sensory Class have done work on the topic of Marvellous Machines this term. We have done different work in all our lessons related to this topic.

For example, we have used The Wonder Machine (Timms/Brenlla) for our main Sensory Story. This is a great book to use as a vehicle (no pun intended) for sensory exploration. In the book, the inventor Mr Woolf has lots of different encounters as he searchers for the Wonder Machine. So, in class we have explored water — as Mr Woolf sailed across the river; we have used musical beaters and tubes — as Mr Woolf helped mend things; we have smelt and tasted different foods — as Mr Woolf invented a food machine.

Similarly, in our 4D lessons we have thought about different types of vehicles and how we can explore then using our senses. So, we have used bubble machines and a big fan to imagine what it would be like in a hot-air balloon; we have counted-down to a 'rocking' as we imagined what it must be like to launch in a rocket; we have played in sand as we imagined being in a tractor ploughing the ground.

In our RE and Jigsaw lessons our theme has been about Celebrating Difference, and inturn 'Celebrating Being Me'. This has allowed us to think about each other, show what we are good at, see what other people are good at, and make choices.

In our ECT lessons we have enjoyed using switches to operate machines in the classroom and the food technology room. One of our favourite activities was making (and eating) Angel Delight. We also discovered that we could make our own playdough using a food mixer.

In Music everybody has had fun joining in with transport sound effects to the song "We all go travelling by". We listened to a lot of different transport noises and found that the sound of a fire engine siren was very popular in our class.

It has been a good term in the Primary Sensory Class — and with Christmas to come we are sure it will finish on a high. We look forward to next term's topic A Carnival of Colour.







SCERTS

We have had lots of fun exploring our topic of Marvellous machines.

We developed our fine manipulative skills whilst completing a spiral pattern to complete our robot's tummy.





We looked at how aeroplanes worked and with support from the TA's made our own paper aeroplanes. We then raced them outside to see whose could fly the furthest.

During our maths lesson we created vegetable rockets. We had to follow the sequence of vegetables to make them.





We used a variety of machines within our sand tray and looked at the tracks. We examined the similarities and differences for each of the different tracks.

LM

Our topic this term has been Britain at War, exploring life in World War 1 and World War 2. We have looked at life in the trenches as a soldier, evacuees, rationing, home front jobs and even experienced what to do in an air raid! We have been brave pilots flying spitfires in a dogfight! Learning about rationing and even cooking using World War Two recipes. I think we will stick to food we have now though! We have enjoyed comparing life from then and now and here are some pictures of our hard work!

FH

This term our topic has been 'Marvellous Machines' and Class FH have been taking part in a sensory story where they have travelled through time to visit dinosaurs, cavemen, Beethoven, a race track, some aeroplanes, a rocket launch and the future! (It's been a busy term!)

The pupils have each designed and decorated their own switch to activate the machine and chosen the sound that it makes as well as creating the time actual time machine. We have also been busy making rocket pictures, robot art and car track prints.













SL

This term we have enjoyed getting stuck into our Britain at war topic. The first half term saw us explore World War 1, using soundbites, diary extracts and images we were able to explore the daily life of a soldier on the front line including experiencing the 'Christmas Truce' game of football! After half term we switched focus to World War Two, kicking it off with a WW2 day within school. Thanks to our local PCSOs the students were given the chance to manipulate genuine WW2 memorabilia, weaponry and uniforms which they all enjoyed. We have met the significant figures of Winston Churchill and Alan Turing, and the key roles they played before trying their hand at code breaking, enigma style. We tried our hand at cooking WW2 style by following the rationing guidelines - turns out WW2 pancakes taste good! The class looked locally for their geography discovering how Hull was affected by the Blitz and comparing Hull then to now. Finally, in science we explored some of the alternatives to an air raid siren, it was a great noisy lesson.







As part time teacher Patrick also worked in classrooms on a supply basis, supported colleagues to develop sensory aspects of teaching and learning, and volunteered in the swimming pool. Before long he had become indispensable and his contract was extended to full time permanent teacher of children with PMLD with an additional responsibility for music throughout the school. His work as music lead impacted everyone in school bringing children, staff and families together to celebrate achievement throughout the year in assemblies, school events, concerts, plays as well as out of school performances with Hymers College, The Colours of Music, The Royal Shakespeare Schools Project, the Hull Daily Mail Awards, the Big Sing and, the pièce de résistance, the performance with internationally renowned musicians as part of the New Paths Musical Festival in Beverley where the children won the hearts and minds of the audience and were rewarded with a standing ovation. Using optimusic systems, the soundbeam and a range of adapted percussion instruments alongside his own phenomenal talent on piano, keyboard, violin or quitar Patrick was able to bring music to everyone, including the tone deaf staff of which I am one. The Freddie's Family new and old will have many fond memories of Patrick; swimming with dolphins in Florida, guitar duets with Mr Boyes in Keswick and the unrecognisable Ali Gee in the staff panto to mention but a few. It seems we kept him by the skin of the teeth for as long as we possibly could as he moved closer towards those heady days of retirement. Patrick is now enjoying part time residency in a second home on the East coast and continues to perform musically at a variety of public events.

Changes to our Senior Leadership Team (SLT)

As many of you will be aware, we said a fond farewell to Mrs Ribey at the end of the Summer Term 2020 after many years of service to the school. Her departure meant that there would be a change in the structure of our SLT.



Mrs Moorcroft, former headteacher at Tweendykes School, is now the Executive Head of Frederick Holmes and Tweendykes School. She has many years of SEN experience across the region and is also heavily involved in planning for the new SEN school that is being built over the next couple of years.

Mrs Maddison has moved from her role as Assistant Headteacher to Head of School, working closely with Mrs Moorcroft and the rest of the staff to ensure that Freddie's is the best it can be.



Mr Weller remains in place as Assistant Headteacher, continuing in his many roles including the Designated Safeguarding Lead.

Miss Bowen has also moved from her role as class teacher and 14-19 lead to Assistant Headteacher, continuing to work closely with the 14-19 department and design of the curriculum.



Wendy Midgely continues to be our School Business Manager, working with SLT and HET to manage the operational running of the school.





School Improvement Plan 2020-2021

Each year the school evaluates the progress levels of pupils and assesses the effectiveness of teaching and learning. From this we then consider our priorities for the coming academic year. This year we have identified the following areas which we will be especially focusing on:

Priority 1 - Embed the revised curriculum across all phases of the school

Last year we spent a lot of time developing a new curriculum across all phases of the school. This year we will be fully embedding and implementing it across the school. Due to the coronavirus pandemic the school also felt it needed to identify a 'recovery curriculum' due to many pupils missing many months of education. Children were baselined around elements including relationships and routines. The new framework now also requires the school to deliver an updated Relationships and Sex Education curriculum and this is being delivered using the Jigsaw scheme of learning.

Priority 2 – Improve outcomes in reading and writing

A number of reading initiatives have already been successfully implemented in the primary school. We are now hoping to embed this in Key Stage 3. We have a new school library and will be refreshing this regularly to engage pupils with their skills and love for reading. Auditing across all phases of the school will be completed to identify support currently in place and new strategies will be identified and impacts of these will be monitored.

Priority 3 - Further improve provision to support pupil's communication

The school recognises that a high proportion of pupils attending are non-verbal and we will be investigating and implementing strategies to enhance their opportunities for communication. This will include trialling different high and low tech Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) with pupils, engaging them directly in the process.

Priority 4 - Further develop provision for pupils with sensory processing disorders

Research shows that activities in a 'sensory diet' can help children stay alert and calm at the right times. With an increased population of pupils on the ASD spectrum attending the school we will be training staff in how to manage sensory processing disorders and investing in an array of appropriate resources and strategies.
